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





In large part based on William Wesbrook's *Dramatic Circumstances: On Acting, Singing, and Living Inside the Stories We Tell*, Christie will guide a small number of participants through questions or simple exercises allowing singers to connect their vocal technique with their storytelling. Some things you might explore: the circumstances of your character, establishing a connection with your "other," going after an objective, using physical gesture rooted in the emotional life of the character, and listening for musical cues that suggest emotional choices you might make. Observers will be given opportunities to ask questions and draw conclusions based on their observations. A handout will be provided to help you take what you've learned with you and put it into practice outside the workshop.


Brian Martin

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SUPPORT THE FUTURE

MTA awards one \$2000 scholarship to a deserving highschool senior who intends to pursue a degree in theatre (performance, technical, or design) at a Mississippi college or university. The award is presented during the MTA Festival.

Scholarship recipients are required to take theatre-related courses and maintain at least a 2.5 GPA taking a minimum of 12 hours per semester. These courses must be in a theatre-related program at a Mississippi college or university (this does not include extracurricular workshops or summer theatre camps). Scholarship students are required to be a part of the Dream Team for their first year of receiving the scholarship. For their remaining years, they will be given first choice of being a part of the Dream Team.

Those wishing to receive a scholarship for acting must register for and attend the auditions for colleges and universities. Those wishing to receive a scholarship for a technical-related major in theatre must register for and participate in the Tech Interview Process for colleges and universities. Both the audition and interview events typically take place the Thursday evening prior to the State Festival in January. Members of the scholarship committee will be there to observe both events.







THE STEPHEN CUNETTO AWARD


