Thank you for your interest in MTA's Mississippi High School Regional Drama Festival! The Regional Drama Festivals (North DramaFest & South DramaFest) are two-day one-act play competitions that bring schools from across the North and South regions together to share their hard work and their love of theatre.

The state is separated into North (above 1-20) and South (below I-20) regions for the regional festivals. North DramaFest is held at Mississippi State University in McComas Hall. South DramaFest is held at Oak Grove High School.

The Regional DramaFests are the qualifying festivals for the MTA Secondary One-Act Festival held during the annual festival in January (MLK Weekend) every year.

The DramaFest host schools work with the MTA Board of Directors and staff to provide the best theatrical experience possible.

Observing schools are welcome at DramaFest! This is a great opportunity to see what the festival has to offer. See the registration costs section of this document for pricing information.

DramaFest Registration Process

There are THREE (3) steps to the DramaFest registration process. 1.) DramaFest Letter of Intent Jotform; 2.) Registration Jotform; 3.) Supporting Materials Jotform. Instructions and information are below.

1.) Letter of Intent

- a.) Open for Submission: September 13, 8:00 a.m.
- b.) Secures a performance spot for the festival
- c.) Each region can accommodate up to 16 performing schools
- d.) Performance spots will be filled on a first-come, first-served basis
- e.) If a region reaches capacity, additional schools will be placed on a waiting list
- f.) Observing schools DO NOT need to complete the Letter of Intent

2.) Registration Jotform

- a.) Registration Window: October 1 November 1, 11:59 p.m.
- b.) Performing schools must provide all the information below
- c.) **Observing schools** must complete the registration form but will not have to provide production information

d.) Demographic information

- i.) Demographic information assists MTA in gaining insights into the diversity of student participants
- ii.) Provide race/ethnicity information of participating students
 - (1) White/Caucasian
 - (2) Black/African American
 - (3) Hispanic/Latino
 - (4) Asian
 - (5) Native American/Alaskan Native
 - (6) Hawaiian Native/Pacific Islander

e.) Required play information

- i.) Title
- ii.) Author(s)
- iii.) Publisher

f.) Proof of rights and royalties

- i.) Contract (or equivalent proof) for play performance (.pdf)
- ii.) Proof of permission to cut (if applicable) (.pdf)
- iii.) Proof to use any other published materials (music, videos, etc., if applicable) (.pdf)

g.) Festival program information

- i.) Cast/crew information as a **ONE PAGE** editable word document (.doc, .docx)
- ii.) Title of play
- iii.) Author of play
- iv.) Publisher/royalty agent & required attribution text
- v.) Cast of characters (including character names and actor names)
- vi.) Production team (including director[s], crew, and other support)
- vii.) Other information to be included in the festival program, space permitting (e.g., setting, special thanks, etc.)
- viii.) Social media handle & hashtags (as applicable)

h.) Special advisory information

 i.) If your production contains potentially sensitive material, please check the <u>MTA Handbook</u> for recommended advisory warnings.







3.) Supporting Materials Jotform

- a.) Supporting materials deadline: November 21, 10:00 a.m.
- b.) Statement of Circumstance & Declaration of Work
 - i.) Document how work on your production was completed
 - ii.) Adjudicators will receive this document
 - iii.) Download fillable .pdf, complete on the computer, save, and upload to the Supporting Materials Jotform

c.) One-sheet program

- i.) The one-sheet program is given to adjudicators to help them identify specific performers during deliberation (.pdf)
- ii.) List characters with a sufficient description of their appearance to help adjudicators accurately identify the performers
 - (1) Example 1: "BJORIA: dark red pants, combat boots, green army-style jacket, dreadlocks Zoë Panlener"
 - (2) Example 2: "ENSEMBLE: blonde wig, purple pants Chance DeLacey"

d.) Labeled cast photo

- i.) Submit a clearly labeled, staged production photo (.pdf or .jpg).
- ii.) Label the photo with performers' and characters' names
- iii.) All performers should be in costume and labeled with the name of the character and the performer
- iv.) This photograph will assist the adjudicators in accurately identifying performers
- v.) This photo should not exceed 8x10" or 2400x3000 px

4.) Registration Costs

- a.) Competing school fee \$100
- b.) Observing school fee \$0
- c.) Student fee \$15 each, whether competing or not
- d.) Chaperone 1 free per 5 students
- e.) Additional chaperones or observers \$10 each





Production Selection Information

MTA prohibits schools from bringing a selection that was produced at a regional festival in the three years prior to the current festival year. Refer to the Banned Productions lists below when selecting a festival piece. The productions marked with an asterisk (*) were MTA State Festival productions and cannot be performed at either regional festival (North or South).
